Alberta FASD Cross-Ministry Committee 2009 <u>FASD Adult assessment and</u> Diagnosis Discussion Paper

On November 18 and 19, 2008 approximately 70 key stakeholders with experience and expertise in assessment and diagnosis from across North America gathered in Edmonton to discuss the basic elements of a omprehensive and coordinated system for conducting assessments and developing diagnostic criteria of FASD among adult populations in Alberta. The first day of the forum included a presentation of the current evidence on leading practices in assessment and diagnosis of FASD among adult populations; strengths and limitations of current approaches utilized by leaders in Alberta's FASD service delivery system; and a facilitated discussion regarding potential improvements and priorities.

The discussions and presentations on November 18th formed the basis of this discussion paper. Participants were provided an opportunity to review the discussion paper and provide feedback, which has been incorporated into this final version. People with fetal alcohol spectrum disorder (FASD) present challenges to those who work in the criminal legal system. Prenatal exposure to alcohol can cause physical, neurological, and psychological impairments. It is vital to understand the individual offender in order to address the underlying reasons for criminal behavior. Individuals with FASD often come from dysfunctional backgrounds, and may have mental illnesses and substance use disorders. A comprehensive medical - legal report, prepared by a professional experienced with FASD, can help judges and lawyers understand how complex the interactions are among brain damage, genetics, and the environment. The person with FASD can be misunderstood in court, victimized in jails, and mismanaged in the transition back to the community, unless those working with the individual are aware of FASD and its implications.

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During 2005, First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada joined in partnership with Pauktuutit Inuit Women of Canada to conduct a study to better understand FASD services and non-academic FASD training in First Nations and Inuit communities across Canada. Our study was designed to capture an overall understanding of the kinds of FASD services available in First Nations and Inuit

communities and, the extent of FASD training opportunities available to First Nations and Inuit service providers and community members. While a growing body of research and promising practice materials have begun to address the complex FASD matters impacting First Nations and Inuit peoples across Canada, our joint effort to map training opportunities is part of a relatively uncharted territory. We hope to contribute to the growing body of practical knowledge and research in this area in three principal ways:

- By mapping the kinds of FASD services and training opportunities for First Nations and Inuit service providers and communities members across Canada.
- By reporting on the process of our study and highlighting our findings about the kinds of FASD services and FASD training opportunities in First Nations and Inuit communities.
- the sustainable development of FASD services and training opportunities must take a priority place in health funding for First Nations and Inuit communitiesacross Canada.

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Golden, Janet 2006 Message in a Bottle Harvard University Press A generation has passed since a physician first noticed that women who drank heavily while pregnant gave birth to underweight infants with disturbing tell-tale characteristics. Women whose own mothers enjoyed martinis while pregnant now lost sleep over a bowl of rum raisin ice cream. In Message in a Bottle, Janet Golden charts the course of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) through the courts, media, medical establishment, and public imagination.

Long considered harmless during pregnancy (doctors even administered it intravenously during labor), alcohol, when consumed by pregnant women, increasingly appeared to be a potent teratogen and a pressing public health concern. Some clinicians recommended that women simply moderate alcohol consumption; others, however, claimed that there was no demonstrably safe level for a developing fetus, and called for complete abstinence. Even as the diagnosis gained acceptance and labels appeared on alcoholic beverages warning pregnant women of the danger, FAS began to be de-medicalized in some settings. More and more, FAS emerged in court cases as a viable defense for people charged with serious, even capital, crimes and their claims were rejected.

Golden argues that the reaction to FAS was shaped by the struggle over women's relatively new abortion rights and the escalating media frenzy over "crack" babies. It was increasingly used as evidence of the moral decay found within marginalized communities--from inner-city neighborhoods to Indian reservations. With each reframing, FAS became a currency traded by politicians and political commentators, lawyers, public health professionals, and advocates for underrepresented minorities, each pursuing separate aims.

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In the major league draft of 1971, the first player chosen from the State of Oklahoma was Ron Williamson. When he signed with the Oakland A's, he said goodbye to his hometown of Ada and left to pursue his dreams of big league glory.

Six years later he was back, his dreams broken by a bad arm and bad habits—drinking, drugs, and women. He began to show signs of mental illness. Unable to keep a job, he moved in with his mother and slept twenty hours a day on her sofa.

In 1982, a 21-year-old cocktail waitress in Ada named Debra Sue Carter was raped and murdered, and for five years the police could not solve the crime. For reasons that were never clear, they suspected Ron Williamson and his friend Dennis Fritz. The two were finally arrested in 1987 and charged with capital murder.

With no physical evidence, the prosecution's case was built on junk science and the testimony of jailhouse snitches and convicts. Dennis Fritz was found guilty and given a life sentence. Ron Williamson was sent to death row.
